Trauma and Gender in 20th Century European Literature International Conference 11th & 12th March 2016 - University of Strathclyde, Glasgow

By taking a Medical Humanities approach to the 20th century landscape of trauma, this conference seeks to explore how European literature engages with gender and trauma. Our premise is that the discussion of mental health in literature may constitute a symptomatic representation of existing views, but it may also constitute a subversive discourse and even a coping mechanism. The emphasis placed on verbalization by literature and psychoanalysis suggests the use of narration as a therapeutic tool. However, the existing research in various fields from medicine to psychoanalysis delivers a wide variety of interpretations and does not clearly account for the role of gender in the verbalization/writing of trauma.

In addition, by taking gender specifically into account, this conference aims to shed new light on the existing assumptions which permeate the medical history of trauma, so that our understanding and our models of trauma become more nuanced, interdisciplinary and versatile. It is envisaged that this event will provide a platform for discussion and networking.

Confirmed keynote speakers: Professor Marianne Hirsch, Columbia University, Dr. Lucia Aiello, University of York

We invite proposals for papers which explore any the following issues:

- In what ways has European literature/cinema depicted trauma in the 20th Century?
- To what extent do medical and scientific ideas about trauma feature in literary texts?
- Do women and men word their reactions in the face of trauma in a distinctive way? In what ways can trauma be a gendered experience?
- Does gender impact on literary representations of trauma?
- How does the experience of trauma shape the identities expressed in literature?
- How can gender be accounted for in the methodology of Trauma Studies?
- Abstracts of 200-300 words for 20 minute papers in English, along with a brief (100 word) biography, are to be sent to traumagender2016@gmail.com by **15 October 2015.**

Brits Abroad: A portrait of British migrants in Spain 14 October 2015 to 23 October 2015



Brits Abroad is a project aiming to take the debate on migration in Britain beyond the statistics and stereotypes usually seen in the mainstream media.

Over 5 million British citizens live outside of the United Kingdom, with over 2,000 people moving abroad every week.

Offering an original look at the issue of immigration, British photographer Charlie Clift choose not to focus the current situation in the UK but to look the other way and focus on British people who are living abroad to encourage people to think twice about immigrants within their own communities as well as British people abroad. In this sense, Clift photographed emigrants near the Mediterranean coast of Spain where there is a large British population. His portrait images show these migrants in locations key to their life in Spain. Most notable is the variety within the people shown impossible to group them into a homogeneous stereotype because some cannot speak Spanish and have hardly integrated with the locals whilst others have married Spanish people and educated their children in local schools.

Charlie Clift is a regular photographer of The Sunday Times Magazine and The Independent. Supporter of many charitable causes, he has worked on campaigns for Action for Children and Help for Heroes. His personal work is focused on portraying British emigrants, experimenting with different ways of making images and telling stories. His personal work has been published widely on the BBC News Website. 12 Star Gallery, Europe House, London

A literature evening with Kirmen Uribe & Jesus Carrasco 13 October 2015

Spanish authors Kirmen Uribe and Jesus Carrasco will visit Manchester's Instituto Cervantes, due to a literary tour that will take them to several cities of England. They will talk about their respective works amongst other topics, in a very intimate and enjoyable talk conducted by the also writer Mariana Casale.

Kirmen Uribe (Ondarroa, 1970) is one of the most relevant writers of his generation in Spain. He won the National Prize of Literature in Spain in 2009 for his first novel Bilbao-New York-Bilbao. The languages in which the novel has been translated already exceeds fourteen. His poetry collection Meanwhile Take My Hand was a finalist for the 2008 PEN Award for Poetry in Translation. His works has been published by several American publications as The New Yorker, Open City, Circumference and Little Star.

Jesus Carrasco (Badajoz, 1972) is author of the novel Intemperie (Out In The Open, 2013), considered Book of the Year by the booksellers of Madrid and already translated into over 13 languages. The novel was a massive success at Francfort's Book Fair in 2012, where the book's rights were sold even before it was published in Spain. The Spanish film producer Morena Films has bought the rights of this book to make the film.


